# The Nativity of our Lord and God and Saviour Jesus Christ

Each year as we celebrate the Feast of Christ's Nativity, We are surrounded by many customs and traditions. Some stores begin putting up Christmas decorations and playing the familiar Christmas carols as early as September. As we get closer to western Christmas, the decorating, shopping for presents and parties can become almost a frenzy of activity. Yet, for those of us who celebrate Christ's Nativity according to the Julian Calendar, there can be an awkward period between December 25th and January 7th when the decorations are taken down and things return to 'business as usual.'

On the one hand, it's good that the world around us acknowledges Christmas each year, but on the other hand, the over emphasis on the secular and human aspects of Christ's Nativity, seems to compete with the spiritual meaning of this great Feast. Fortunately, our Orthodox Church has preserved for us the great mystery of Christ's Incarnation through the Divine Services, writings of the Holy Fathers and Sacred Tradition.

In order to better appreciate the true meaning of the Incarnation, we must go back to the Garden of Eden, for it was there that our ancestors Adam and Eve disobeyed God's commandment and brought about the Fall of our human race. Not wishing to leave mankind in this sorrowful condition, God decided to be born as a man of the Most Pure Virgin Mary in order to open the way back to our heavenly home and bring salvation to all those who would believe in Him and follow His commandments.

St. Theophan the Recluse compared this with the following image: "A king promises freedom to a man who is imprisoned in a dungeon and bound with fetters. The prisoner waits a day, then another, then months, and years. He sees no fulfillment of the promise, but does not lose hope, and believes in the king's words. Finally, he sees signs that it is coming soon. His attention increases—he hears a noise; someone is approaching with cheerful words. Now the locks fall and the liberator enters. "Glory to Thee, O Lord!" the prisoner involuntarily cries, "The end of my imprisonment has arrived, and soon I will see God's light!"

This image resonates with the famous statement of St. Athanasius the Great: "The Son of God became man, that we might become god." In the Gospel of John 10:34, the Lord says "Is it not written in your Law, I said ye are gods?" The Holy Fathers tell us that when we receive the Grace of the Holy Spirit at our Baptism, we are reborn into a new spiritual life. With God's help and the help of the Church, we can receive the strength to struggle against the sinful passions and acquire the virtues. However, our participation in the Holy Sacraments of Confession and Communion and all the rest, are essential in order for us to 'become God-like' through deification as our Holy Fathers called it. Let's reflect on these things that we might better be able to give thanks to God for this great gift of His Incarnate Son, Who frees us from death and sin and offers us salvation and eternal life!

### The News at St. Michael's –January 2021

<u>Feasts & Fasts</u>: During the month of December, we celebrated <u>The Feast of the Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple</u> on Friday, 12/4. Then, on Friday, 12/25, we celebrated the <u>Feast of St. Herman of Alaska</u>, followed by a potluck feast meal. Moleben & Akathist services were also held most Wednesday evenings in December.

**Education**: The Nativity Spiritual Study Group began after the Moleben Services on Wednesday evenings. A simple fasting meal of soup, salad and bread was also served. In addition, Inquirer/Catechumen classes were held on most Saturday afternoons.

<u>Visit from St. Nicholas</u>: On Sunday, 12/20 following the Divine Liturgy, St. Michael's had a visitor: St. Nicholas of Myra. St. Nicholas told the children about his life and then handed out gifts of 'gold' coins and tangerines and each child received an icon of St. Nicholas. As charming a character as "Santa Claus" is, it's important that our children learn who the REAL St. Nicholas is!

<u>Upcoming Feasts & Fasts</u>: The <u>Feast of the Nativity of our Lord & Saviour Jesus Christ</u> will be celebrated with the Vesperal Liturgy on <u>Wednesday</u>, Jan. 6th at 6pm and on <u>Thursday morning Jan. 7</u> with Matins at 8:45am and Divine Liturgy at 10am, followed by a potluck meal. (*Please note that the Vesperal Liturgy is a Communion Service, so anyone wishing to receive Holy Communion should fast after lunch time on Wed. Jan 6th). We will also celebrate the <u>Feast of Theophany</u> with Vespers at 6pm on Monday, Jan. 18<sup>th</sup> and on Tuesday, Jan. 19<sup>th</sup> with Matins at 8:45am and Divine Liturgy at 10am. The <u>INDOOR Blessing of the Waters</u> will take place after Vespers on Monday 1/18, so please bring your Holy Water bottles so you can take some home (please be considerate of others and bring moderate sized bottles — 12oz or less, so everyone can get some. If you run out, you can always ask for more later). The <u>OUTDOOR Blessing of the Waters</u> will take place after the Divine Liturgy on Tuesday, Jan. 19<sup>th</sup>.* 

<u>Catechumen & Inquirers Class</u>: Classes will resume on Saturday afternoons at 4:00pm beginning with January 16<sup>th</sup>.

<u>St. Michael Moleben & Akathist Services</u>: These services will continue on Wednesday evenings at 6:00 pm starting on Wednesday, January 13<sup>th</sup> at 6pm.
