<u>Property Update</u>: After a very intense four weeks from mid-October to mid-November, (pulling over 200 stumps, removing the tree limbs from the clearing areas, and getting the 1,200 feet of initial gravel roadway base put in), we've taken a much-needed break. Since then, we've been meeting with contractors, architects, civil engineers and city officials to clarify the next steps. Our approach will be to continue using 'sweat equity' wherever possible in order to stretch our dollars and utilize professionals when necessary. Please keep our property development efforts in your prayers for we are always in need of God's help!

From the *Missionary Letters of St. Nicholai Velimirovic: "To a Teacher Nikola S. about why Christ had to be born and did not just appear"

You have asked why Christ had to be born, grow and be tormented? Why did he not suddenly appear out of the Heavens in the form of a grown man, like Apollo does in Hellenic fairy tales? A completely inappropriate comparison! How can one compare a true man with a phantom, and the true man with made-up monsters?

As much as heaven is above the earth, so much is the wisdom of God beyond the reason of man. According to the wisdom of the Most High, Christ had to come into the world as a child and as a youth and as a mature man, so that He

could be accessible to everyone and gain everyone. Had He never been a child, His words would have been pale and cold – "Let the children come to me and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven." And also the other saying, "Indeed I say to you, if you do not return and become as children, you will not enter into the kingdom of heaven." You are a teacher of children. Think, as a teacher, how different your relationship with children would be had you not been a child.

Christ could have undoubtedly appeared to the world as you imagine. But had He done that, He could not have been for the human race what He wanted to be, that is, the Teacher and Savior of all, and an example to all generations.

A thought torments you. You think that the Lord has magnified the mystery of His being for our reason by His unusual birth. But would His mystery not be far greater and less comprehensible had He suddenly appeared among men, outside of any kinship with them? Would the world then not talk of Him as of an apparition? In that case, His person, and along with it His teaching and sacrifice, would lose their true foundation and true meaning. For if He had been an apparition, who would listen to and imitate an apparition?

The Lord also had to be born, exactly in the way in which He was, in order to show us the possibility and point out the importance of our spiritual rebirth, which is in the center of His teaching about man. According to His word, "If one is not born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." As He was born of the Holy Spirit from the body of Mary the Virgin, so can we be spiritually born of the Holy Spirit in the purity of our soul. Great Orthodox elders have always taught that the rebirth of a man is conditioned by a virginal purity of the soul. In other words, souls which completely cleanse themselves, even from impure thoughts, come to resemble the pure Virgin, and are deemed worthy by God's goodwill to become the habitation of Christ. If Christ's birth from the Virgin Mary is not easily comprehended by the human mind, it is fantastically beneficial and inspiring for all those who desire a spiritual and moral rebirth of their being.

So, be at peace and thank the eternal Wisdom that the Savior of mankind had appeared as He Himself thought it was best. And exclaim with the Apostle Paul, "O the depth of the riches and wisdom and understanding of God!" And greet your schoolchildren with a child-like joy:

Christ is born, children!
